

Finding your way around......






A map can help because it shows where all the different rooms are and you can easily see the quickest way to get there.

The School Day

One of the first pieces of information you will be given in September will be your timetable. It is very important because it not only tells you which lessons you will have that day but also gives you a clue about equipment you will need to pack in your bag the night before.

It also tells you what time each lesson starts and finishes and in which room they will take place. If you haven't got a watch, it might be a good idea to get one to practice telling the time so you get to places on time.

Usually the timetable will also let you know which teacher you will have for each subject. Instead of just one teacher, you will need to get used to lots of different people being in charge of your class. Often, the timetable will have the teachers' initials next to the subject you will be learning.

You will have 6 different lessons every day. These are called Periods and some will be in special rooms. For example, Science will usually take place in the laboratory.



There is also a Whole School Assembly every week,

You need to be in Registration at 8.30am every day, so you should come into school and be in by 8.20am



Homework is a really important part of your learning. In Year 7 you may start to get a lot more homework than you have been used to. Teachers will be stricter about getting it done and handed in on time too.

Why is homework important?

Homework is really important because it shows the teacher whether you have understood the work or not. It also means that you can cover more work than the time allowed in lessons.

We also set homework online through Show My Homework (SMHW). You can download this as an app on your phone or computer.

We also have a Homework Club that you should go to because you will get help from the teachers there.

You need to make sure that you really understand all the rules about homework. Below are some questions you could ask your form tutor.

HOMEWORK QUESTIONNAIRE

Here are some questions that you could ask your Form Tutor about homework.

Breaking the rules
